

Remarks from Dr. Florence Nakayiwa, RUFORUM Deputy Executive Secretary, Planning, Resource Mobilisation and Management during Webinar III - Universities' role in preparedness, response and monitoring of emerging and re-emerging pandemics. 3<sup>rd</sup> July 2020

Thank you Moderator.
