Background

Agriculture and the broader agri-food system across Africa remains a primary source of employment and incomes for most of the population. Agricultural productivity growth remains one of the key challenges to be addressed by in the continent, but it is by no means the only challenge, especially for fragile and resource-rich countries¹. Notwithstanding the need to address the numerous challenges still facing the continent's agriculture, progress is being achieved on various fronts and agricultural growth in the continent is making fundamental leaps and bounds. By 2014, Rwanda reported lifting at least one million people out of poverty owing to the strategic interventions they implemented arising from their commitment to the Comprehensive Africa Agriculture Development Programme (CAADP) requirement to increasing agricultural productivity².

Sub-Saharan Africa in particular has made realised the highest rate of agricultural growth of any region of the world since 2000, at roughly 4.3 percent per year. This growth has

undoubtedly contributed to the region's relatively strong economic transformation process. The factors that enabled this growth include the sustained period of relatively high global food prices beginning in 2006. This was a foundation for increased global demand for food, especially higher prices for livestock products that require food grains for animal feed, rapidly developing land markets in the region, and macroeconomic and sectoral policy reforms, which provided greater scope for private investment in trading, processing, and retailing agricultural inputs and commodities. These consequently contributed to increased employment and incomes in the upstream and downstream stages of African agri-food systems.

Further, as the continent rapidly urbanises, major opportunities are opening up and the African farmers and entrepreneurs are tapping into these opportunities. The agri-food systems in the continent are being transformed, rapidly adapting and the supply chains are becoming longer than ever before. These are opening up space for the continent's processing capacity. Equally, the young Africans are gradually realising the immense opportunities in the sector and are reshaping the narrative as well actions across the various segments of the sector. Notwithstanding the continent's agricultural challenges, Africa has unique story of progress to share beyond the common narrative of a poor and treacherous continent.

Purpose of the dialogue

The purpose of this dialogue is twofold:

- Converge Africa's experts, policy makers and decision leaders as well as
 practitioners to share evidence and lessons of success from various agricultural
 development interventions and policy directions that have been successful in the
 continent
- 2. Map-out actions and possible interventions for accelerating positive agricultural transformation in Africa

Expected outputs

1. A positive narrative of Africa's agricultural performance shared with the global audience

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2. Scalable solutions and experiences from within Africa adapted to the local context
